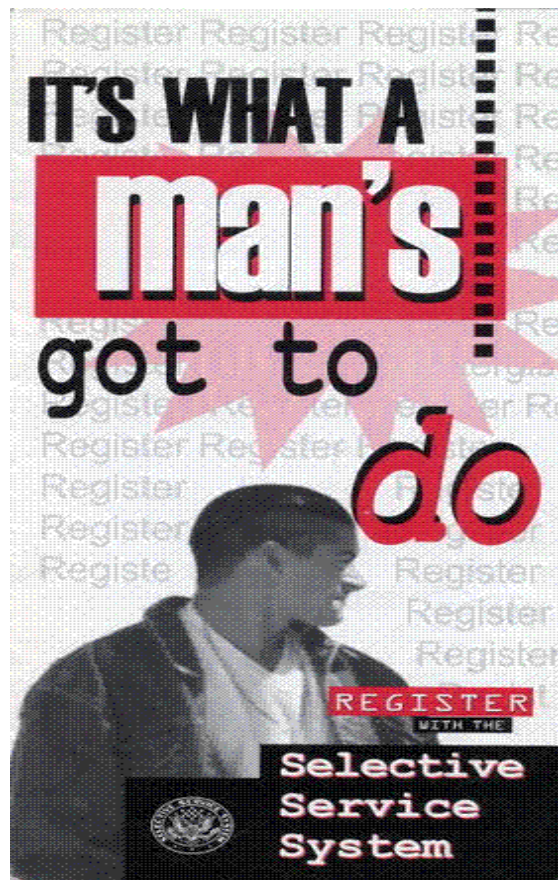

...lose their children?

According to the Education Department

"After taking into account such factors as mothers' involvement, fathers' and mothers' education, household income, and children's race-ethnicity, children are still more likely to get better grades, to participate in extracurricular activities, and to enjoy school, and are less likely to ever repeat a grade if their fathers are involved in their schooling compared to if they are not."

Yet, Fathers are unprotected against false charges in court and are routinely prevented from being with their children.

...become disenfranchised?

85% of men who pay child support and earn less than \$10,000 can quickly fall behind in payments after a single bump in the road, like losing a job – which is soon followed by forfeiture of their professional and driver's licenses; or passport. They may even lose their right to vote –literally and completely disenfranchised. They may never recover emotionally or financially; or, see their children again. Many are hungry, homeless living on the street; or, commit suicide.

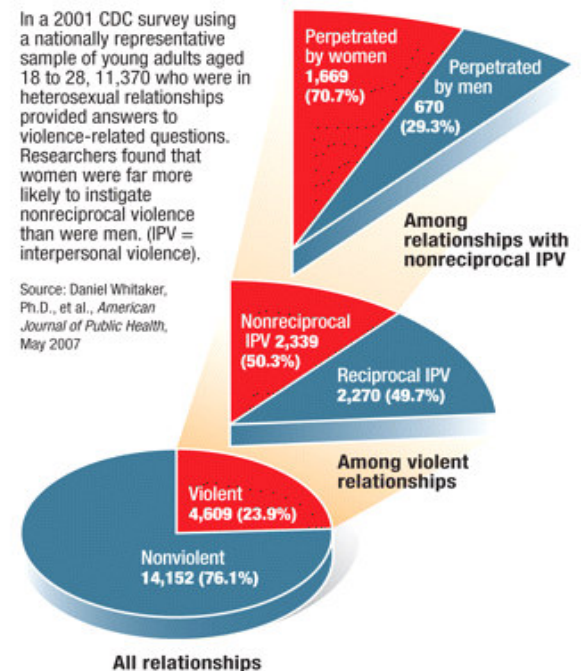
...get blamed for

all domestic violence? Women only DV Industry operatives squander billions of taxpayer dollars with this deception. Scientists are clear that men and women perpetrate DV at similar rates. Yet men are still vilified to protect the operatives' power, control, and wealth.

Women Often the Aggressors

In a 2001 CDC survey using a nationally representative sample of young adults aged 18 to 28, 11,370 who were in heterosexual relationships provided answers to violence-related questions. Researchers found that women were far more likely to instigate nonreciprocal violence than were men. (IPV = interpersonal violence).
